

Use only the AC adaptor included with the unit. Connecting a different AC adaptor can cause serious damage to the internal circuitry and may even pose



Use only the supplied power cord

Use only the AC power cord supplied with the AC adaptor included in the package.



Do not excessively bend the power cord

Do not excessively twist or bend the power cord otherwise you damage it. Damaged cords may cause fire and shock hazards!.



Do not place the unit in an unstable location

Do not place the unit in a unstable position where it might accidentally fall over.



Take care not to allow liquid or foreign objects to enter unit; Do not place containers with liquid on unit

2 Relevant Indications

In addition to the items listed under "Important Safety Instruction" on p. 5, please read and observe the following:



Power supply related

- Do not plug this unit into the same electrical outlet used same by an
 electrical appliance that is controlled by an inverter or a motor (such as
 a refrigerator, washing machine or air conditioner). Doing so, can result
 an audible noise.
- The power adaptor may become warm after long hours of consecutive use. It can be a normal dissipation of heat through the adaptor casing.
 To reduce the possibility of overheating place the power adaptor on the floor in a well-ventilated location.
- Before connecting the unit to other equipment, turn off the power to all equipment. Otherwise, electrical shock or damage to the equipment may occur.
- If the unit is not operative for 120 minutes. to prevent unnecessary power consumption, this unit features an "AUTO OFF" function that automatically turns the unit off. If you don't want the unit to turn off automatically, change the "AUTO OFF" setting to "OFF" as described on "Auto OFF" (p. 70).

NOTE

The "AUTO OFF" setting is memorized when you switch off the unit.



Related to appropriate location

- Do not place the unit near power amplifiers (or other equipment containing large power transformers) to avoid induced hum. In case of hum, to reduce the problem, change the orientation of your unit or place it away from the source of interference.
- Do not use this unit in the vicinity of a TV or radio. This unit may interfere with radio and television reception.
- When using this unit along with application on your iPhone/iPad, we recommend that you set "Airplane Mode" to "ON" on your iPhone/iPad in order to avoid noise caused by communication.
- Noise may be produced if cell phones are operated in the vicinity of this unit. In case of noise you should relocate such wireless devices so they are at a greater distance from this unit, or switch them off.
- Do not expose the unit to extreme cold or heat, to direct sunlight or near devices that radiate heat. Do not leave the unit inside an vehicle during the day. Extreme temperature can damage the unit.
- Take care when move the unit from one location to another with drastic changes in ambient temperature. Condensation can occur in the unit due to drastic change of temperature. Using the device while condensation is present can cause damage. If there is reason to believe that condensation might have occurred, leave the device for several hours until the condensation has completely dried out.
- Do not place, for long periods of time, vinyl, plastic or rubber objects on this unit. Such objects can discolor or otherwise harmfully affect the finish
- Do not place objects for long period of time on top of the keyboard.
 This can be the cause of malfunction of the keys of the keyboard.
- Do not apply any stickers, decals or self-adhesive material to this unit.
 The glue is difficult to remove and solvents are damaging the exterior finish
- Do not place object filled with liquid (glass of water on this unit. Avoid to use alcohol, perfume, hairspray, nail polish, etc., near the unit. In the event of liquid spill on the unit, swiftly wipe away the surface using a dry, soft cloth.



Maintenance related

- To clean the unit, put a soft cloth in lukewarm water, squeeze it well, then wipe the entire surface using an equal amount of strength.
 Rubbing too hard in the same area can damage the finish.
- If your unit has a polished finish, it needs careful, periodic care. Dust should be removed using a soft feather or wool-type duster. Care should be taken not to apply pressure to the finish or to drag the dust across the finish, which can create fine scratches in the surface. Fingerprints or similar marks can be cleaned with a dampened soft cloth, followed by a dry cloth. In cases of stubborn greasy dirt, using a small amount of mild detergent (such as mild dishwashing liquid) on the damp cloth may help. Do not use any cleaners or detergents, since they might deteriorate the surface of the cabinet, and produce cracks. Do not use dusting cloths that contain chemicals.
- Do not wipe this unit with benzene, alcohol or solvent of any kind.
 Doing so may result in discoloration and/or deformation of the unit.



Related to repairs

Related to external memories

- Insert the USB Memory (commercially available) into the slot with care and at the correct angle.
- Take particular care when handling USB Memory:
- Always ground yourself to something metal before handling an USB Memory
- Do not touch the pins of the USB Memory connector, or allow them to become dirty.
- Do not subject the USB Memory to temperature extremes (e.g., direct sunlight in an enclosed vehicle)
- · Do not allow the USB Memory to become wet
- Do not drop or subject it to excessive shock or vibration.

The raised main lid serves as a reflecting surface for the sound waves that radiate from the soundboard. Thanks to the short and long lid stick the main lid can be manually raised or lowered.

NOTE


- Do not let children open or close the main lid. When opening or closing the Main lid, take care not to pinch your fingers between the moving part and the body of the unit.
- If you need to move the unit, make sure that the main lid is closed to prevent accidents.

Opening the Main Lid


WARNING

When opening the cover, be careful not to open it too high.


Opening the lid too high may damage the piano, or cause the lid to fall.



 Grasp the right side of the main lid (1) with both hands, and slowly raise it.



2. Use one hand to sustain the lid, raise the lid stick and fit it into the socket as in the illustrations.



WARNING

Do not release the lid until the lid stick is completely locked in the socket. To prevent falling of the lid, be sure that the lid stick is stable in the socket.

Closing the Main Lid

NOTE


Do not let children open or close the main lid. When opening or closing the Main lid, take care not to pinch your fingers between the moving part and the body of the unit.

1. Grasp the right side of the main lid with a hand, and raise the main lid a litle bit and, with the other hand, release

the stick from the socket.

Place the stick in its rest position and slowly lower the lid to close it.

Connecting the Pedal Cord



 Connect the pedal cord that come from the dedicated stand here.

For further information see the Assembling Manual.

Listening Through Headphones

You can use headphones to enjoy the VIVO H10 MG without disturbing those around you, such as at night.

1. Here you can connect stereo headphones. VIVO H10 MG has two headphones jacks. Two people can use headphones simultaneously.



Rotate the VIVO H10 MG's [VOLUME] knob to adjust the volume of the headphone.

Cautions when using headphones

• To prevent damage to the cord's internal conductors, avoid rough

handling. When using headphones, mainly try to handle either the plug or the headset.

- Your headphones may be damaged if the volume of a device is already turned up when you plug them in. Minimize the volume before you plug in the headphones.
- Excessive input will not only damage your hearing, but may also strain the headphones. Please enjoy music at a reasonable volume.

Connecting an Optional Microphone

By plugging an optional microphone in the MIC socket, you can use the VIVO H10 MG to accompany yourself while you sing.

MEMO

Your VIVO H10 MG allows you to record in WAVE format your performance including the microphone signal.

 Rotate the [VOLUME] knob counterclockwise to minimize the volume.

You should do so every time you need to connect or disconnect a microphone. Furthermore, only increase the setting if you actually wants to sing, and then set it back to the minimum value.

1. Connect an optional microphone (unbalanced mono 1/4") in the "MIC" socket.



- 2. Rotate the VIVO H10 MG's [VOLUME] knob to adjust the volume.
- Sing or talk into the microphone and gradually turn the "MIC LEVEL" knob to adjust the level of the microphone signal.
- **4.** Rotate the VIVO H10 MG's [MIC EFFECT] knob to adjust the amount of the current effects.

NOTE

Howling could be produced depending on the location of microphones relative to speakers. This can be remedied by:

- Changing the orientation of the microphone.
- Relocating microphone at a greater distance from speakers.
- Lowering volume levels.

Connecting an External Amplifier

You can connect the OUTPUT jack to external amplifier, stereo system, or other stereo audio device.

- Rotate the [VOLUME] knob counterclockwise to minimize the volume.
- 2. Connect the VIVO H10 MG's OUTPUT jacks positioned to the right rear bottom panel to the inputs of your external amplifier.



Connecting the VIVO H10 MG to Your Computer

If you use a USB cable (commercially available) to connect the VIVO H10 MG to your computer, you can record and play **audio and/or MIDI data** by your MIDI software (DAW software).

NOTE

To use the USB audio streaming you need of a computer equiped with MAC OSX or LINUX, an iPad or iPhone.

NOTE

VIVO H10 MG does not support GM/GS standard.

What do you need to connect the VIVO H10 MG with your computer?

- USB cable (type A-male type B-male: commercially available)
- Use a standard USB cable (A→B-type connectors, commercially available) to connect the VIVO H10 MG to your computer as shown below.



NOTE

- Switch on the VIVO H10 MG before you start up the DAW software on your computer.
- Before to connect any other equipment, move the [VOLUME] knob counterclockwise to minimize the volume.

Now, the same sound coming out of the VIVO H10 MG can be recorded into your computer and the sound from your computer can be played from audio system of the VIVO H10 MG.

Connecting the VIVO H10 MG to an USB MIDI Keyboard (USB host function)

Usign the following connection, your piano becomes a master (host). You can connect other keyboards or modules from any brand directly to the DEXIBELL USB "Memory" port and exchange MIDI data without a computer and without using two MIDI cables.

The connection consists of the following main components:

- Your DEXIBELL piano.
- One slave MIDI USB Devices as a keyboards.
- A physical bus represented by the USB cable that links the devices with the host.

USB "Computer" port

Slaves

Connecting an USB Memory (commercially available)

 Plug an USB Memory to the MEMORY port on the VIVO H10 MG's right panel located under the keyboard.



Carefully insert the USB Memory making sure that the connector on the device is appropriate and that it is connected in the proper direction.

NOTE

The VIVO H10 MG supports all USB memory (FAT 32 formatted).

Anyway, because there are so many USB memory on the market and it is almost impossible to check all types of memories, it could happen that a memory is not compatible with your instrument.

How to Format the USB Memory

- 1. Press the "MENU" button.
- Use the [▲] [▼] buttons to select the "USB MEMORY" functions group and press the [▶] button to access them.



3. Use the [▲] [▼] buttons to select "FORMAT" and press the [EXECUTE] Function button to access the function. The display shows:



 Press the "YES" Function button to format the USB Memory.

A confirmation message informs you that the USB memory has been formatted.

Safely Remove the USB Memory

NOTE

You should always safely eject the USB Memory before physically unplugging it from USB socket. Before to unplug the USB Memory use the "USB REMOVE" function.

- **1.** Press the "MENU" button.
- 2. Use the [▲] [▼] buttons to select the "USB MEMORY" functions group and press the [▶] button to access them.



3. Use the [▲] [▼] buttons to select "REMOVE" and press the [EXECUTE] Function button to access the function.

The display shows:



 Press the "YES" Function button to safely remove the USB Memory.

Now you can unplug the USB Memory safely.

Turning the Power On/Off

Once everything is properly connected, be sure to follow the procedure below to turn on their power.

1. Rotate the [VOLUME] knob counterclockwise to minimize the volume.

NOTE

Before turning the VIVO H10 MG on/off, always be sure to turn the volume down. Even with the volume turned down, you might hear some sound when switching the VIVO H10 MG on/ off.

However, this is normal and does not indicate a malfunction.

2. Press the VIVO H10 MG's [①] button located on the right panel to switch it on.



The power will turn on, a progress bar appear in the VIVO H10 MG's display,.



After a brief interval, the main page will appear. and VIVO H10 MG will be ready to produce sound.



3. Use the [VOLUME] knob to adjust the volume.

NOTE

This unit is equipped with a protection circuit. A brief interval (a few seconds) after power up is required before the unit will operate normally.

Turning the Power Off

 Rotate the [VOLUME] knob counterclockwise to minimize the volume.

NOTE

To avoid malfunctions, never disconnect the AC/DC adaptor while the instrument is turned on.

2. Press the VIVO H10 MG's [①] switch.

A power off confirmation message appears:



3. Press the "YES" Function button to confirm.

The display shows the following message:



and the unit will turn off after few seconds.

If you do not want power off press the "NO" Function button.

NOTE

If you need to turn off the power completely, first turn off the $[\c U]$ button, then unplug the power cord from the power outlet. Refer to "Connecting the AC Adaptor" (p. 18).

If you do not operate the unit for a certain period of time while the power is on, this unit turns off automatically.

If you don't want the power to turn off automatically, turn the "AUTO OFF" setting off!

With the factory settings, the unit's power will automatically be switched off 120 minutes after you stop playing or operating the unit.

Shortly before the VIVO H10 MG shuts down automatically, the display starts counting down the seconds. If you want to keep using the VIVO H10 MG at this stage, press any button.

If you don't want the power to turn off automatically, change the "AUTO OFF" setting to "OFF" as described on p. 70.

Demo of the VIVO H10 MG

Your VIVO H10 MG contains a demo that introduces all the best of its tones.

1. Simultaneously press the [$\stackrel{\angle}{\Delta}$] and [SONG] buttons.



Playback starts automatically with the demo song.

Grand Piano Mode

NOTE

At power-on, the instrument is automatically selected in Grand Piano Mode.

 From the Main page, simultaneously press the first and last Function button.



The "Grand Piano" tone is called and all various parameters are modified to play the best piano sound.

2. Play the keyboard to enjoy the piano sound.

How to Customize and Save Your Grand Piano Mode Configuration

You have the possibility to customize the configuration of the Grand Piano mode by changing the tone and the various parameters of the instrument and save your configuration through the "SAVE AS G.P. MODE function.

How to Select Tones

 Press the desiderate Tone button to select the sound category that you want to play.





Press again the "MUTE OFF" Function to exit from mute function.

How to Play All Parts at the Same Time (Layer or Split mode)

Previously we saw how to play 2 different tones over the entire keyboard (layer) or splitting the keyboard (split). Now we will explain how to play three different tones in Split or Layer mode.

To enable the instrument to play all parts we need to set opportunely a global parameter, the "4hands" parameter.

How to Enable the Instrument to Play Three Tones

At default, the "4hands" global parameter is set in "4hands". Please see "4 Hands" (p. 70).

This means that, if we press the [and [button]] button contemporary, we will access to "4 Hands" mode. See "Four Hands Mode" (p. 30).

To enable the instrument to play all parts (three tones) in layer or split mode we have to change the "4hands" global parameter

setting in "Split+Layer". Please see "4 Hands" (p. 70).

- Press [MENU/EXIT] button and select GLOBAL function. See "Moving the cursor and setting parameter values" (p. 25).
- 2. Use the [▲], [▼] buttons to select the "4hands"parameter and use the [◄] [▶] buttons to set "Split+Layer".



Play Three Tones in Split or Layer Mode

You can play all parts (Main. Coupled and Lower) in layer or split mode.

10 Four Hands Mode

When this mode is active, it is as if you had two separate 44-keys pianos with the same playing range and octave.

The right pedal act as damper pedal for the right piano section.


The left pedal must be assigned as damper pedal for the left piano section (see below).


Going Around Sound Effects

VIVO H10 MG is quite simply a superlative instrument with the most advanced and best sound generation technology Dexibell has to offer.

When you recall a Tone the instrument automatically add the appropriate effects for that sound.

Anyway, VIVO H10 MG give you the possibility to change type of effect or modify some parameter of it.

VIVO H10 MG manage two units of effectors (FX-A and FX-B) for each keyboard part (Main, Lower, Coupled).



 To access the "EFFECTS" page, press the [MENU] button and select the page using [▲], [▼] and [▶] button.



2. Select one of FX pages relative to the keyboard part ("MAIN FX", "LOWER FX" and "COUPLED FX").



In the example we selected the "MAIN FX" page.

3. Use the [◀] [▶] buttons to choose the Type of effect.

Press the "ON/OFF" Function button if you don't need the FX processor.

For the list of effects see "Effects Types and Parameters List" (p. 71)

- **4.** Use the [▲] [▼] buttons to select the parameter relative to the chosen effect.
- **5.** Use the [◄] [▶] buttons to adjust the parameter value. For details about the parameters for each effects, see p. "Effects Types and Parameters List" (p. 71).

Adding Reverb to the Sound

The reverb enables you to select various digital reverb effects that would add extra depth and expression to the sound to create a realistic acoustic ambience.

1. While the main page is displayed, press the left Function button to access the Reverb parameters.

You can also select this function pressing [MENU] button → EFFECTS → REVERB.

- 2. Use the [▲] [▼] buttons to specify the part you wish to change the Reverb level.

Changing the Reverb Type

This parameter allows you to specify what kind of reverb effect you need.

Transposing the pitch of the keyboard

The Transpose setting allows the pitch of your digital piano keyboard to be raised or lowered in semi-tone steps.

This is particularly useful when accompanying instruments tuned for different keys, or when a song learned in one key must be played in another key or when a singer sing in a key different than the original music.

1. Press the $[\frac{b}{4}]$ button.



The display shown the following page



2. Use the [◄] [▶] buttons to adjust the transposition value.



If you set a value different than 0, the $[^{b}/^{\sharp}]$ button indicator lights and the keyboard is transposed.



You can also select this parameter pressing [MENU] button SETTING \rightarrow TRANSPOSE.

Shifting the Tuning of a Keyboard Part in Octave Steps

The Octave function is an useful parameter that allows you to change the pitch of the selected part in octave steps (12 semitones at a time).



1. From the Main page, press the "SETTING" Function button to access the MAIN SETTING page.



The Main setting page can be also selected using [MENU] button
→SETTINGS→MAIN SETTING.

- 2. Use the [▲] [▼] buttons to select the "Octave" parameter.
- **3.** Use the [◀] [▶] buttons to set the desiderate octave for the Main part.

In this page you can also adjust the audio level and mute the part. For details see the "MENU Options (Advanced Section)".

4. To change the Octave of another keyboard part, press the function button related to the part.

Adjust the Volume of the VIVO H10 MG

1. Use this knob to set VIVO H10 MG's overall volume.



At default, the "VOLUME" knob adjusts the volume of the internal speakers and adjusts the sound that comes out of the "OUTPUT L/MONO" sockets.

Adjusting the volume of the internal speakers and audio output separately.

Sometimes it can be useful to adjust the volume of the internal speakers only, leaving the volume of the external outputs unchanged or vice versa. To do this you need to set the parameter "Mode" appropriately:

 Press [MENU/EXIT] button and select CONTROL→VOLUME function. See "Moving the cursor and setting parameter values" (p. 25).

The following page is shown:



If you rotate the Volume knob it adjusts the volume of the internal speakers and adjusts the sound that comes out of the "OUTPUT R - L/MONO" sockets. This is the default behavior.

2. Use the [◄] [▶] buttons to set the "Mode" parameter to "Int" instead to "Int.+Ext".



Now, if you rotate the VOLUME knob it adjudt the volume of the internal speakers only. The volume of the external "OUTPUT R - L/MONO" sockets is fixed to 127. To adjust the volume of the "OUTPUT R - L/MONO" sockets you need to change the "Ext. Level" parameter.

- Use the [▲] [▼] buttons to select the "Ext. Level" parameter.
- **4.** Use the [◀] [▶] buttons to set the desiderate volume for the "OUTPUT R L/MONO" sockets.

How to Balance the Level of the Internal Speakers (Tweeter, Woofer, Table, Back)

The VIVO H10 MG's internal amplification has been designed to simulate a real grand piano. The amplification has been specially adjusted by the factory to achieve this but, if you want, you can adjust the loudspeaker amplification level to your taste. You can emphasize the mid-high frequencies by increasing the volume of the Tweeters or emphasizing the bass by raising the level of the woofers. You can increase or decrease the intensity of the soundboard vibrations (Table) and the volume of the rear speakers box (Back).

If you wish, when the lid is closed, you can choose whether to exclude the amplification of the soundboard and the rear speakers box. See "Lid Sensor" (p. 70).



Master Equalizer

The equalizer give you the possibility to boosting or reducing the low-frequency or high-frequency range of the sound. Adjust the Master EQ parameters to reach the best possible sound when listening through different reproduction systems, headphones, or an external speaker system.

13 Additional Sound (Sound Library)

What is a Sound Library?

The sound (patch) in the DEXIBELL's devices is composed of several oscillators that reproduce waveforms. The patch contains also information about Pitch,/TVA,/TVF envelope, filters and so on. All this and more contributes to shapes the sound.

A Sound library contains sounds that use the same waveforms. For example, the "Electric Piano" library, contains the following sounds: Dyno Stage, Suitcase, Phaser EP, etc.

The VIVO H10 MG's Internal Flash Memory contains the Sound Libraries. This memory is divided into two parts of 3.2 GB:

- the first part, not erasable, contains the Factory Libraries.
- the second part, programmable, can contain the User Sound Libraries.

Using the list of libraries to load, at the power on, the VIVO H10 MG load the sound libraries from the Internal Flash Memory into the Internal RAM of 3.2 GB. At default, the list contains the Factory Libraries only.

You can load the new libraries into the User Sound area by taking them from the DEXIBELL library (www.dexibell.com) or from third-party sounds (.SF2 extension).

By a programmable list you can choose which sound libraries (User or Factory or part of them) to load in the RAM Internal Memory. You can decide to completely.

By a programmable list you can choose which sound libraries (User or Factory or part of them) to load in the RAM Internal Memory. You can decide to completely replace the factory sounds loading all sound from the User sounds area or decide to load a part of the sounds from the factory area and another from the User area.



15 Personalizing Your Sounds (T2L)

T2L-Modelling



The revolutionary technology found on all models of DEXIBELL digital Pianos.

T2L-Modelling is the combination of innovative technologies developed to achieve maximum timbre accuracy and precise sound responsiveness to the multiple articulations of a pianist.

T2L modelling has many algorithms that simulate all the characteristics of an acoustic piano. It take care of many aspect as:

No Damper ("No Damper" on high notes)

The last 18 higher notes, like in the acoustic instrument, do not have the presence of the dampers and then are free to vibrate even when keys are released.

The duration of these notes, playing in staccato mode, is much longer than the previous notes that instead have the presence of the damper



FP-Simulation ("Forte Pedal" multi actions simulation)

The "Forte" Pedal (Sustain), performs several actions that are simulated through this function.


A) When the "Forte" pedal is pressed, a sound is generated to simulate the damper friction noises of felts when releasing from the strings (Damper Friction Noise).

B) Pressing the "Forte" pedal, the active notes will be enriched with resonances produced by all strings free to vibrate, thanks to the raised dampers (Strings Resonance). The result of the Strings Resonance makes the sound of a sustained note by the use of the "Forte" pedal substantially different from the sound of a just held note.

C) When the "Forte" pedal is released, a noise is simulated like the mechanical noise in the acoustic instrument (Sustain Pedal Mechanical Noise)



(A) & (B) "Forte" pedal is pressed, felt dampers are raised



(C) "Forte" pedal is released, felt dampers are resting on strings

SP-Simulation ("Soft Pedal" Simulation)

The "Soft" Pedal, acts a change of volume and timbre color of the sound, simulating the "soft" function on the acoustic piano.

Making Slight Additions or Sound Alterations

Although Dexibell sound are developed to achieve the maximum sound accuracy, you can necessity to modify them at your taste them or create new sonority.

- 1. Select the sound that you want personalize.
- 2. From the main page press the "T2L" Function button to access the Editor function.



You can also select this function pressing [MENU] button →T2L FDITOR

Attack of notes contains an impulsive portion of sound produced by the hit of the Hammer to the strings, amplified and sustained by the resonance of the piano body. A function is available to reduce/increment this element of the sound.


This is the typical noise of an acoustic piano when the pedal sustain is pressed (lift all dampers) or released (lower all dampers).

String Reso (Sympathetic Harmonic Resonances)

As in the acoustic Piano, while holding down some keys and playing other notes in staccato mode, a multitude of additional harmonics can be listened, thanks to "sympathetic resonance" generated by the free to vibrate strings (due to raised dampers) of the held notes.

It's the typical noise generated by the free to vibrate strings (all damper raised) when the damper pedal is pressed.

Click (for Vintage Organ)

The key click is typical of vintage organs. It's a electrical pop which was the result of the keys making contact. It was considered a defect, there were all kinds of efforts to reduce it, but it never could be eliminated. Meanwhile it has become a characteristic "click" for rock and modern musicians. You can adjust quantity of click sound when press and release a key.

Growl (for Eletric Piano)

This is a typical distortion of the sound during the phase attack that give a "growling" effect. Thank to this parameter you can increase or decrease the effect.

You can adjust the quantity of the noise effect that some instrument produce when the key is released.



This parameter adjust the quantity of the noise of the trumpet when the piston is pressed.

Attack, Hold, Decay, Sustain and Release (For Brass, Strings, Pad, Choir, Synth)

These parameters characterize the envelope of the sound. For example, when a organ key is pressed, it plays a note at constant volume; the sound dies quickly when the key is released. By contrast, the sound of a guitar is loudest immediately after a string is plucked, and quickly fades. Try to change the envelop of a sound by these parameters.

This parameter increase or decrease the volume of Ride Cymbals sound contained in the "Ac. Bass&Ride" tone.

Adjusting the Keyboard Velocity Response According to the Sound

By the "Velocity Compand" function in the T2L MENU, you can adjust the keyboard velocity for each sound. You can choose to expand the velocity of a Piano sound and compress the velocity of a strings or Pad sound.

- 1. Access to the T2L EDITOR" function and select the keyboard part and the sound you want to edit. See "Making Slight Additions or Sound Alterations" (p. 42).
- In the example below we selected the sound of the Main part. Use the [▲] [▼] buttons to move the cursor and select the "Velocity Compand" function.



3. Press the button [▶] to access the function.





16 Using an Microphone (optional)

By plugging an optional microphone in the MIC socket, you can:

- Accompany yourself while you sing. See "Connecting an Optional Microphone" (p. 20).
- Add vocal effects such as reverb and delay, adjust the tone of your voice by a dedicate equalizer.
- Control the dinamic range of your voice using a dedicated compressor.
- Cut out lower frequencies of your voice by a Low Cut Filter.
- Easily select from six microphone settings already preset by the factory as "Standard", "Talk", etc, etc.
- Record your voice in high quality sound. See "Recording Your Performance" (p. 52)



NOTE

Use only dynamic microphones.

Cautions when using a microphone

- Lower the volume before you connect a microphone to the VIVO H10 MG. If the volume is raised when you connect a microphone, noise may be output from the speakers.
- Howling could be produced depending on the location of microphone relative to speakers of your instrument or/and amplification system.

This can be remedied by:

- · Changing the orientation of the microphone.
- If you use esternal speakers, relocating the microphone at a greater distance from them.
- · Lowering volume levels.

Adjusting the Microphone Level and the Amount of Vocal Effects

 Sing or talk into the microphone and gradually turn the "MIC LEVEL" knob to adjust the volume of your voice and balance it with the volume of the piano sound.

NOTE

If you don't hear anything, check the setting of the [VOLUME] knob.



2. Use the "MIC EFFECT" knob to adjust the amount of vocal

effect (Reverb and Delay).



Adding Dedicate Vocal Effects

Take advantage of the VIVO H10 MG's voice effects to enhance your vocal.

REVERB EFFECT

What is the Reverb effect? When you make a sound in any room or outdoors, the sound waves travel around that space, bouncing off the walls before returning back to your ears as a series of delayed echoes. This effect gives depth to the sound adding a near-far dimension. Reverb and Delay are the most widely used effects.



VIVO H10 MG gives you the ability to control this effect through many preset (macro) and parameters as the size of the room, the level, etc, etc.

DELAY EFFECT

What is the Delay effect? . It's the results of the reflection of the sound similar to the reverb but works on the big spaces as canyon or inside a gigantic room. Delay is also called echo

You can control this effect by many preset (macro) and parameters as the time of the delay, the level, etc, etc.

Reverb Effect

 Press [MENU/EXIT] button and select MICROPHONE→Reverb function. See "Moving the cursor and setting parameter values" (p. 25).




What is a Compressor?

A compressor reduces the dynamic range of an audio track by lowering the volume level of the loudest parts. This will result in an audio track that has fewer variations in volume. The audio compression is a must specially for the voice recording. It evens out the erratic levels that a singer can produce and it lower transients that can cause digital distortion.



 Press [MENU/EXIT] button and select MICROPHONE→Compressor function. See "Moving the cursor and setting parameter values" (p. 25).


Setting the Low Cut Filter

What is a Low Cut Filter?

Also known as a high pass filter, It's a filter that allows to cut low-frequency signal usually from 40to 300 Hz. These frequencies are often the same ones associated with ambient room noise.



18 Recording Your Performance

Your digital piano allows you to record your performance and save it internally or to an USB storage device.

Record and play back what you've played on the instrument can be an effective practice aid.

Recording as Audio Data

Your performance will be recorded as audio data. The recorded song can be used on your computer, phone and in any audio player.

NOTE

To use this method of recording, you must connect a USB drive (sold separately) to the USB Memory port (p. 21).

Recording Your Music as audio data (WAVE).

This useful function allows professional quality stereo recordings. If a microphone is connected to the MIC socket, you can add your voice to the recording.

You can reproduce directly by a portable music players by using a computer.

Recording are saved in the external USB Memory (commercially available). In addition, the VIVO H10 MG digital piano allows you to record audio from a bluetooth device. See "Wireless Function" (p. 59).

NOTE

 You will need a USB Memory (commercially available) to record your performance.

Before you start recording

- 1. Connect the USB Memory to which you wish to save the audio data. See "Connecting an USB Memory (commercially available)" (p. 21).

The song are saved with a different progressive number: rec_0001.wav, rec_0002.wav and so on.

Listening to your recording

6. Press the [►/II] button to listen your song.

If you want to re-record again, repeat from step 4.

You should always safely eject the USB Memory before physically unplugging it from USB socket. Before to unplug the USB Memory use the "USB REMOVE" function. See "Safely Remove the USB Memory" (p. 22).

How to Record your Performance over an Existing Audio Base (Overdub)

This is a technique used in audio recording. While listening to an existing recorded audio base, play a new performance along with it. All is recorded in a new song.

- 2. Prepare everything you want to record: select the tone and the keyboard mode that you want to use for performing. See "Selecting Tones" (p. 26).
- 3. Load a existing audio base. See "Loading a Song From Internal Memory" (p. 50).
- 4. Press the [●] (Rec) button to start recording.
- 5. Press the [P/II] button to start the playback of the audio base as background.
- **6.** Play your performance while listen the audio base.
- **7.** At the end of song, press the [●] (Rec) button to stop recording.

The recording stop and the display shows a confirmation message.

8. Press the [►/II] button to listen your song.


Working with the Memories

Using the Memories is a lot faster than calling up one of the VIVO H10 MG's functions, modifying the settings, etc., while playing.

VIVO H10 MG provides 80 Memories that allow you to store almost all settings (or registrations) you make on the front panel and the various display pages. Additional Memories can be imported directly from a USB Memory.

About the Memories and Memory Set structure.

The Memories you create are saved in the internal Memory Set or in an external Memory Set previously saved in the USB Memory. This allows you to prepare one set of Memories for weddings, another for corporate events, a third for anniversaries, etc.

Some Information About the Master Tune

Pianos are generally tuned to an A 440 pitch standard that was adopted during the early 1900s in response to widely varying standards. Previously the pitch standards had gradually risen from about A 415 during the late 1700s and early 1800s to A 435 during the late 1800s. Though A 440 is generally the standard, some orchestras, particularly in Europe, use a higher pitch standard, such as A 444.

The modern pianos are tuning in Equal Stretch temperament, in which every pair of adjacent pitches is separated by the same interval.

There are other scale used in different music style. Modern musical scale in western culture are different in one other way from older classic music. At the time of Bach the scales were based on the note A being about 415 Hz. In the Handel's time the frequency A was 422.5 Hz and today it is 440.0 Hz.
